Iowa's bottle deposit law, popularly known as the "Bottle Bill," passed in 1978 and includes all carbonated and alcoholic beverage containers. Its impact is both environmental and economic. Here are some facts about the economic impacts of the law through litter reduction and recycling:

HAS THE BOTTLE BILL CREATED JOBS?

The economic activity created by the Bottle Bill supports jobs involved with the collection, handling and processing of beverage containers:

BEVERAGE CONTAINER REDEMPTION CENTERS


OTHER BENEFICIARIES OF INCOME FROM CONTAINER RECYCLING

■ Energy savings of creating a new aluminum can from recycled aluminum compared with creating a new aluminum can from the original bauxite ore 95%^e


Number of times aluminum container




Recycling needed to save enough energy to light four 100-watt light bulbs for one hour
